THE JAMAICAN IGUANA

Scientific Name: *Cyclura Colle*i Common Name: Jamaican Iguana Habitat: Hellshire Hills, St. Catherine – Jamaica Native Land: Jamaica

The Jamaican Iguana (*Cyclura collei*) is endemic to Jamaica and was fairly well distributed throughout the country until the mid 1800's.

The introduction of the mongoose in this period resulted in the near extinction of the Jamaican Iguana. So complete was its disappearance, the Jamaican Iguana was declared extinct in 1948. It was officially "rediscovered" in the Hellshire Hills in the 1990s.

Predators and threats of the Jamaican Iguana:

Goats

compete with the Iguana for food by eating the vegetation in its habitat

Wild Pigs destroy the Iguana's nesting sites which are situated on the ground

> **Dogs** hunt and eat the mature Iguana

Wild Cats eat the young Iguana when they hatch

> Mongooses eat Iguana eggs and hatchlings
